Saint Francis Xavier

(1506-1552)


Patron of our College

Born in a noble family as Francisco Javier (in Spanish) or Francis Xavier (in English) at a place called Javier in the Kingdom of Navarre (in presentday Spain), he was a companion of Ignatius of Loyola and one of the first seven Jesuits who started the international Catholic men's congregation called Society of Jesus (Jesuit Order). After having acquired Master's Degree from the University of Paris, he led an extensive mission from 1534 into Asia, mainly in the Portuguese Empire of the time and was influential in evangelization work, most notably in India but even beyond in Japan, Borneo, Malacca, Macau and the Maluku Islands. In his attempt to extend his missionary preaching to mainland China, he died on Shangchuan Island in 1552. His incorrupt body was brought to Goa and his non-composing state of body remains even after 450 years and is kept in Silver Casket at Bom Jesus, Goa. He is credited with establishing St. Paul's College (in Old Goa), the first Jesuit College in India in 1542.

The Society is responsible for 1865 Educational Institutions in 65 countries. These Institutions engage the efforts of approximately 98,500 teachers. They educate approximately 1,800,000 students. Rev. Fr. Arturo Sosa Abascal is the present Superior General of the Jesuits.

In India, the Society of Jesus is responsible for 388 Schools, 68 Colleges, 14 Technical Institutes, 22 Business Administration/Management Institutes, 13 B.Ed. colleges, 1 St. Joseph's University, 2 Xavier Universities, 1 Law College and 1 Engineering & Technology College with approximately 8,500 teachers educating 3,50,000 students belonging to every social class, community and linguistic group.

The Jesuit tradition of education in India began in 1542 when St. Francis Xavier, one of the first members of the Society of Jesus, reached Goa and started 1st Jesuit College named St. Paul's College. It is in his memory, and under his holy patronage, that **North Bengal St. Xavier's College (NBSXC)** was established in 2007. After holding the first session in Matigara as a temporary arrangement, the college moved to Rajganj in Jalpaiguri District in 2008. In July 2016, the college expanded to establish its Siliguri Campus offering BBA & B.Com courses there.

Brief History of North Bengal St. Xavier's College

North Bengal St. Xavier's College (NBSXC) is a Christian Minority Institution established in 2007 by the Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal with permanent affiliation to the University of North Bengal. Through its twin campuses in Rajganj and Siliguri, NBSXC offers undergraduate courses in Arts, Science, Commerce and Business Administration. It also offers UGC-affiMated careeroriented courses. The community college section of North Bengal St. Xavier's College also gives skill training to the marginalized and the underprivileged groups of our society. The college's 32 acres green campus has well-equipped classrooms with digital projection and audio-visual facility, modern laboratories, wellstocked seminar, and central libraries, boys' and girls' hostels, a large auditorium and seminar hall, big sports ground, canteen and cafeteria. A range of student support services is also available across the college to provide course advice, counseling services, and career planning and study options. In the last 12 batches, 15 of our students emerged University Toppers with 8 gold medals and 7 silver medals. In 2020, NAAC accredited the college with B+ (1st cycle). The uniqueness of North Bengal St. Xavier's College, however, is to be found not in concrete structures but in its care for the holistic development of its students. The ultimate mission of North Bengal St. Xavier's College is to contribute in a social transformation so that justice, equality of opportunity, genuine freedom and respect for the values enshrined in the Constitutions of India may prevail, and the possibility of living a fully human life may be open before all. Through highs and lows, rain and sunshine, the college continues to uphold the motto *GyanVigyanVimuktaye* — Knowledge and Wisdom Liberate as a pledge to strive for dispelling the darkness of ignorance from within the individual and from society at large.

Rules & Regulations

1. ATTENDANCE

a) To appear for the University Examinations a student requires a minimum of 75% attendance (calculated on the basis of total number of all classes given and the number of classes actually attended by a student).



- b) The College expects the students to maintain maximum attendance, not just the minimum 75% required by University rules.
- c) Those who absent themselves without prior permission from the HODs or Vice-Principal (Administration) are not allowed to attend classes till they meet the principal, explain the reasons for absence, pay a fine and obtain an absentee slip.
- d) At the end of every month up-to-date lists giving attendance of each student will be displayed on the College Notice Board, and those with low attendance will be called for counseling by the Vice-Principal and/ or Counselors.

2. MATTER OF DISCIPLINE & PROCEDURE

- a) During class hours those students who are free must not gather in groups in classrooms and corridors, and indulge in loud conversations which shall cause disturbance and inconvenience to others.
- b) All forms of ragging shall be considered antisocial and criminal acts inviting rustication and legal proceedings.
- c) Students are asked to keep with them at all times their student ID cards issued by the college and show the cards to staff members and college security guards as and when required.
- d) Students are strictly forbidden from bringing outsiders into the campus without the written permission of the Principal.

e) Non-compliance with the rules and regulations of the Colleges, all forms of unruly behavior, defiance and disrespect to teachers and staff, defacing and destroying college property, behavior and activities that goes against the spirit of the college and tarnish its image shall be referred to the college Discipline Committee for appropriate disciplinary action against the errant students.

3. PAYMENT OF FEES

All the fees are to be paid by DD or NEFT or cash payment through bank. Except Bus and Hostel fees, all other fees of the college may be paid at the office counter by Credit and Debit Cards. Student can pay their fees in any one of the following banks in their locality.

Note: Fee Payment for 2nd & 3rd Years: 1st Installment (by 7 August), 2nd Installment (by 7 December) and 3rd Installment (by 7 April) & for 1st Year payment date will be announced separately.

If you want to pay through any bank other than Federal Bank just strike off the Federal Bank and its account number and write the other' Bank name and account number on the top of your fee book. If you do not deposit through your fee book it might go as cash deposited without your name.

Xavier Hostellers may write Hostel Fee in the same fee book or get it stamped in the college accounts office and deposit to the bank to make sure that paid amount goes to your account.

- ➤ The last dates for payment of fee instalments are mentioned in the College Calendar.
- > Students and parents are requested to take note of these dates and pay the fees well in advance through bank / cheque.
- ➤ Those students with genuine reasons for delayed payment of fees must meet the Principal with letters from their parents and obtain his permission.
- ➤ Those who fail to pay the fees by the last dates without prior permission are required to clear the fees along with a fine of Rs. 50/- per day of delay.

Please Note: Considering the financial difficulties face by many families, from academic session 2021-22 the College tuition fee may be paid in three installments (check the dates with accounts office and College Diary) instead of payment per semester.

4. DRESS CODE & UNIFORM

It is recommended that students come to College in simple and unostentatious dress suitable for an academic environment. On Class days students are expected to dress keeping in mind the rich Indian culture and the public expectations from students who belong to educational institutes of repute in India, particularly the Xaverian fraternity of Jesuit institutions. The following specific guidelines are to be observed:

- a) Any kind of captions or writings on Shirts/T-shirts/Tops, etc. are prohibited.
- b) Sleeveless dresses are prohibited.
- c) Only full length trousers are allowed.

- d) Only ankle length skirts are allowed.
- e) For boys, earrings, or ear/chin/nose/lip/eye brow studs, head bands and wrist bands are strictly prohibited.
- f) Wearing caps and sun glasses and sun glasses inside the College buildings is prohibited.
- g) For BBA students, the prescribed uniform is mandatory for daily Class attendance except on Saturday.
- h) On every Monday & Tuesday and on special occasions, students are expected to wear the College uniform. Access to such occasions is only for those who wear the College uniform. On every Wednesday and Thursday, students will wear college T-shirt. On every Friday and Saturday, students may come wearing decent casual dress.

In case of failure to comply with these codes appropriate actions will be initiated.

5. USE OF CELL PHONES

- a) Using cell phones within the campus to record voices, lectures, conversations, photos of others, etc and to play loud music shall be considered serious abuses and shall invite disciplinary action.
- b) Within the College Campus cell phones shall be used only for brief, urgent conversations.
- c) Within the College buildings cell phones must be kept in silent mode.
- d) No one is to use phones in classroom for making / receiving calls.

Hostel and Hostel Rules

College has two hostels - **Xavier Hostel**(for boys only)
and,
Holy Cross Hostel
(for girls only)

Hostel for Boys and Girls

Xavier Hostel (for Boys) and Holy Cross/St Anne's Hostel (for Girls) are open to all the students of this college. Candidates who need hostel accommodation must obtain a separate Application Form (available at hostel office or college office for Xavier Hostel) after having completed college admission process and submit to the hostel directors of concerned hostels. Information related to hostel and hostel fees are given in the prospectus and available in the hostel.

Hostel Rule

- 1. All the hostellers are held responsible to the Principal for their conduct in Xavier Hostel and in public. The Hostel Director/Warden is the immediate hostel-incharge. He is assisted by student councilors who are authorized to control the conduct of the hostellers both in and outside the hostel.
- Students must bring their own bed linen, blankets and other personal supplies.
- 3. Generally, hostellers are expected to be regular and on time for classes. Hostellers whose attendance is poor or who fail repeatedly in tests/internal assessments or who show persistent disinclination to study will be asked to withdraw from the hostel.
- 4. Serious misconduct or habitual violation of rules including being apprehended taking alcohols/drugs at multiple times will lead to initial warning and eventual expulsion from the hostel.

5. More rules will be given at the time of admission and orientation.

Please Note: There are other hostel/accommodation around the college without any control of the college authorities. However, the students residing in these hostels, too, are expected to behave like students of this college. Moreover, in emergency situation such as, outbreak of pandemic, Principal has the power to issue directive to vacate all the hostels/paying guests.



HELP FOR NEEDY STUDENTS

- a) Students who are in need of financial aid should make an application in the prescribed forms which are available in the College office.
- b) Eligible candidates will be chosen by the Needy Students Financial Aid Committee.
- c) Such aid is premised on regular attendance and the sustained academic performance as well as participation in college activities of the recipients, failing which the aid shall be withdrawn.

COUNSELING & REMEDIAL PROGRAMS

- a) Counselors are available for those students who seek career and personal guidance. Career talks by outside agencies too are arranged from time to time.
- b) We discourage our students from taking outside tuition. Our Staff encourage the students to approach them with problems they may have in study matters, and special care is taken to meet the academic problems and needs of each student.

- c) Similarly, those who are weak in studies are encouraged to approach the Principal for arranging special Remedial/Tutorial Classes in the College itself.
- d) Parents/Guardians of those students who may require special care and attention (for reasons of health, etc.) are required to inform the Principal in writing about the matter at the time of admission.

OUTLINES OF 4-YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

1. Major Course (MAJ) (4 credits each):
One major course (for Single Major & Single Minor Course) or two major courses (for Multidisciplinary Course) chosen from the combination of subjects that a student is expected to imbibe in that discipline. A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a

core requirement is termed as a Major Course.

- 2. Minor Course (MIN) (4 credits each): One Minor courses, to be chosen from the combination of subjects, with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline (s) of choice is called a Minor Course. The purpose of this category of these courses is to offer the students the option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices they make in Major.
- 3. Inter-disciplinary Courses (IDC) (3 credits each): All undergraduate students are required to undergo 3-introductory-level courses relating to any of the BROAD DISCIPLINES and whose difficulty level, should not be higher than the +2 level.
- 4. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) (3 credits each): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and laboratory/hands-on training/field work. The prime purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode to increase their employability.
- 5. Internship (2 credits): A student will also have to undergo internship once either at the end of 2ndsemester or at the end of 4thsemester during Summer Vacations.
- 6. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) (2 credits each): One papers of each of the Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two kinds, both pertaining to enhancement in ability in language subjects:
- (i) Single Major and Single Minor course: Compulsory English to be studied in 2ndSemester and one from MIL Bengali or MIL Hindi or MIL Nepali or MIL Sanskrit or MIL Urdu or Alternative English to be studied in the 3rdSemester.
- (ii) Three Discipline Specific Courses (Multidisciplinary): Com-

pulsory English to be studied in 3rdSemester and one from MIL Bengali or MIL Hindi or MIL Nepali or MIL Sanskrit or MIL Urdu or Alternative English to be studied in the 2ndSemester.

- 7. Value Added Courses (VAC) (4 credits each): These courses include courses based on Environmental Education and Value based education:
- (i) Single Major and Single Minor course: Environmental Education to be studied in 1stSemester and Understanding India to be studied in the 4thSemester.
- (ii) Three Discipline Specific Courses (Multidisciplinary): Environmental Education to be studied in 4thSemester and Understanding India to be studied in the 1stSemester.
- 8. Practical/Tutorials (One each with every Major and Minor Course)

Practical means Laboratory or field exercises in which the student has to do experiments or other practical work of two-hour duration. Tutorial means special instructions based on the Lectures. Tutorials include Dissertations/Projects, or Term Papers, or Seminar Presentations, or Class Test, or Field Work, or Group Discussion, or Home Assignments, or Reports.

EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

- 1. Eligibility to appear in an Examination
 A student will be eligible for appearing at any of the Semesters of 4-Year UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM, fulfilling thefollowing two essential conditions:
- (i) Minimum 75% attendance of lectures delivered in all courses.
- (ii) Students should appear in all tutorials/practical classes.

2. Tutorials

Evaluation of the students will be a continuous process and will be based on their performances in Tutorial and the SemesterEnd Examination. All tutorials will be conducted by the Teachers of the Colleges. It will be on the basis of a combination Reports, or Seminar Presentations, or Class Tests, or Field Work, or Group Discussions, or Home Assignments spread overthe entire period of study, as decided by the respective Board of Studies / Expert Panel. The modalities of such assessmentbe recorded and documents will be preserved by the respective college and those must be placed before a committee or Team constituted by the University for verification purpose, if required. The marks obtained in the tutorials will becommunicated to the Examination Branch of the University as and when required by them.

- 3. Final Evaluation& other guidelines
- i. The final evaluation in a course means the total or aggregate of the marks obtained in tutorial / practical and the marks obtained the Semester End Examination.
- ii. There will be one written and one practical examination (wherever applicable) at the end of each semester as perthe prescribed syllabus in the course concerned.
- iii. Marks for vocational/ internship/apprenticeship will be provided by the Colleges.
- iv. In the 4-year Undergraduate Semester system, the Undergraduate Examinations will be held in eight parts: First &Second Semester for the first-year students, Third & Fourth Semester for the second-year students, Fifth & SixthSemester for the third-year students and Seventh & Eighth Semester for the fourth-year students. The academicsessions including the examinations for first, third, fifth and seventh semesters are July to December and that forsecond, fourth, sixth and eighth semesters are January to June.

- v. A student has to complete the 4-year Undergraduate program within a span of 7 years.
- vi. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first & second semesters having secured 43credits and after qualifying the first-year examination. The student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 4 year undergraduate program within a span of 7 years.
- vii. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first, second, third & fourth semesters andhaving secured 84 credits and after qualifying the second-year examination. The student is allowed to reenterand complete the 4 year undergraduate program within a span of 7 years.
- viii. A student may opt to exit only after completion of six semesters and having secured 124 creditsand after qualifying the third-year examination. A student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 4-yeardegree (Honours/Honours with Research) within a span of 7 years.
- ix. A student who secures 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wishes to undertakeresearch at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year.
- x. A student who wants to exit finally with a Bachelor's Certificate/Bachelor's Diploma/Bachelor's Degree has to apply online within 25 days from the date of publication of results of first year, second yearand third year respectively duly approved by the Colleges (modalities to be notified later).
- xi. A student to be eligible for appearing at any of the Semesters of UNDERGRADUATE Examination mustattend minimum 75% attendance of lectures delivered and complete all tutorials/practical classes. All tutorials will be conducted by the teachers of the Department. It will be on the basis of dissertations/projects, term papers, reports, seminar presentations, field work, class tests or any combinations thereof spread over the entire period of study, as decided by the respective Board of Studies/ Expert Panel. The modalities of such assessment will be recorded and

- documents will be preserved bythe colleges at least for a period of six months after the publication of the result of the relevant SemesterEnd Examinations. The University Authority may ask for any such records, if required.
- xii. To secure qualifying grade in a Course/Semester, a student has to secure the minimum 30% marks in the Semester End Examination, 40% marks in the Practical Examination (Lab based subjects only) separatelyand an aggregate of 40% marks including Theory and Practical / Tutorial taken together. To qualify in a Practical-based course, an examinee is to appear in the Theoretical as well as the Practical portion of the examination. If a student fails to appear in any of the portion or fails to secure 30% & 40% marks in the theoretical and practical examinations respectively, the student will have to appear in the portion they have failed to secure the stipulated percentage of marks in the next corresponding semester.
- xiii. The qualifying marks for each course/paper will be 40% in each semester taken together oftutorials, semester end examinations, and practical examinations (minimum 30% marks in thesemester end examination, minimum 40% marks in practical examinations separately).
- xiv. If a student secures qualifying grade in all courses he/she/transgender will be declared to have qualifiedthe said semester and the result will be shown as Q. However, if a student fails to secure qualifying gradein a particular course/paper his/her/transgender result of the concerned semester end examination will bedeclared SNC (Semester Not Cleared). Marks obtained in the tutorials/practicals will be clubbed withmarks obtained in the semester end examination before awarding the grade. If a student fails to secure pass grade in a particular Course, he/she/transgender will have to appear in that course/paper only. Thetutorial marks will be retained for next examination(s) with valid chances.

- xv. The Semester End Examinations will usually be held in the last month of the semesters. Tutorials willcontinue throughout the Semester.
- xvi. The provisional result of each semester will be published stating only the total marks and SGPA obtainedby a student and the 'Grade Card' would be issued showing the details of courses studied (code, title,marks, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA of all thesemesters at the end of each academic session. The provisional result after completion of each year will be published stating full marks, marks obtained, CGPA and Grade.
- xvii. If a student fails to secure qualifying (pass) marks in one paper or more in a particular semester examinationhis/ her/transgender result of semester examination will be declared as 'SNC' (i.e., Semester Not Cleared). The result of 6thsemester examination will be kept withheld unless a student clears all the five semesters within the stipulated span of five years. He/she/transgender would be declared to have passed the 3-yearBachelor's Degree in a discipline in the year in which he/she/transgender clears his/her six semesters. The result of 8th semester examination (Honours/Honours with Research) will be kept withheld unless astudent clears the 4th year (7th& 8thsemesters) within the stipulated span of seven years. He/she/transgender would be declared to have passed the 4-year Bachelor's Degree (Honours/Honourswith Research) in a discipline in the year in which he/she/transgender clears his / her / transgender 8thsemester.
- xviii. A student will be promoted to the Fifth Semester only if he/she/transgender has cleared allthe papers in the first and second semesters. However, a student will get a maximum of three chances forthe purpose. A student will get a maximum of 3 chances each to clear the semester end examinations. A student hasto clear all the six semesters to be promoted to the seventh semester and after completion of the eighth semester within a span of seven years will be de-

clared passed with Honours/Honours withResearch. However, a student who exhausts all the six chances to clear six semesters will get only oneattempt each to clear semester seven and semester eight. A student who fails to complete tutorial/practical classes/ fill up examination form before the examination will not be promoted to the next semester automatically.

FYUGP REGULATIONS

B.A./ B.COM./ BBA/ B.SC./ BCA 4-YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM (FYUGP) WITH SINGLE MAJOR UNDER THE NEW CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK, 2022

OUTLINES OF 4-YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

1. Major Course (MAJ)

The course designed for papers under this category aim to cover the basics that a student is expected to imbibe in that discipline. A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core Course.

2. Elective Courses

Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/ subject/ domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/ skill is called an Elective Course.

- i. Minor Course (MIN) (4 credits each): Two Elective courses, to be chosen with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline of choice is called a Minor Course. The purpose of this category of these courses is to offer the students the option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices they make in Major (Core).
- ii. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) (3 credits each): All UG students are required to undergo 3-introductory-level courses relating to any of the BROAD DISCIPLINES and whose difficulty level, should not be higher than the +2 level.

- ii. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) (3 credits each): These courses may be chosen from Major courses designed to provide value-based and/ or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and laboratory/ hands-on training/ field work. Apart from the above, a student will also have to undergo Internship or Apprenticeship once in the fifth semester.
- iv. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) (2 credits each): Two papers of each of the Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two kinds, both pertaining to enhancement in ability in language subjects:
 - 1st Semester & 3rd Semester: Compulsory English for BA Major, and one from MIL Bengali or MIL Hindi or MIL Nepali or MIL Sanskrit or MIL Urdu or Alternative English, for Other Majors.
 - 2nd Semester & 4th Semester: One from MIL Bengali or MIL Hindi or MIL Nepali or MIL Sanskrit or MIL Urdu or Alternative English for BA Major and Compulsory English for Other Majors.
- v. Value Added Courses (VAC) (4 credits each): These courses include courses based on Environmental Education, Community engagement and service, and Value based education:
 - 1st Semester: Environmental Education for BA Major, and one from Digital Marketing or Understanding India for Other Majors.
 - 2nd Semester: One from Digital Marketing or Understanding India for BA Major, and Environmental Education for Other Majors.
- vi. Vocational Courses (VOC) (OPTIONAL 4 credits):
 One course to be chosen in case of Certificate /

Diploma Level Exit, as stipulated by the respective College authorities.

3. Practical/Tutorials (One each with every Major and Minor Course)

Practical means Laboratory or field exercises in which the student must do experiments or other practical work of two-hour duration. Tutorial means special instructions based on the Lectures.

EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

(a) Eligibility to appear in an Examination

A student will be eligible for appearing at any of the Semesters of 4-Year UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM, fulfilling the following two essential conditions:

- Minimum 75% attendance of lectures delivered in all courses.
- Students should appear in all internal assessments.

(b) Internal Evaluation

The evaluation of the students will be a continuous process and will be based on their performances in Internal and the Semester End Examination. All the internal continuous evaluations will be conducted by the Teachers of the Department. It will be based on a combination of Mid Term Tests and Reports, or Seminar Presentations, or Class Tests, or Field Work, spread over the entire period of study. If a student's internal marks are not uploaded by the College, University will award minimum 2 marks for attendance and the marks obtained will be carried over in case the students fail to pass the course(s).

(c) Final Evaluation & other guidelines

The final evaluation in a course means the total or aggregate of the marks obtained in internal evaluation and the marks

obtained at the Semester End Examination (Theoretical & Practical).

- i. There will be one written and one practical examination at the end of each semester as per the prescribed syllabus in the course concerned.
- ii. Marks for vocational/ internship/ apprenticeship will be provided by the Colleges.
- iii. In the 4-year Undergraduate Semester system, the Undergraduate Examinations will be held in eight parts: First & Second Semester for the first-year students, Third & Fourth Semester for the second-year students, Fifth & Sixth Semester for the third-year students and Seventh & Eighth Semester for the fourth-year students. The academic sessions including the examinations for first, third, fifth and seventh semesters are July to December and that for second, fourth, sixth and eighth semesters are January to June.
- iv. A student must complete 4-year Undergraduate program within a span of 7 years and 3-year Undergraduate program within a span of 5 years.
- v. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first and second semesters having secured 40 credits and after qualifying the first-year examination. The student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 3-year undergraduate program within a span of 5 years.
- vi. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first, second, third and fourth semesters and having secured 82 credits and after qualifying the second-year examination. The student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 3-year undergraduate program within a span of 5 years.

- vii. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first and second semesters and having secured 40 credits and after qualifying the first-year examination. The student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 4-year undergraduate program (Honours/ Honours with Research) within a span of 7 years.
- viii. A student may opt to exit only after completion of first, second, third and fourth semesters and having secured 82 credits and after qualifying the second-year examination. The student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 4-year undergraduate program (Honours/ Honours with Research) within a span of 7 years.
- ix. A student may opt to exit only after completion of six semesters and having secured 124 credits and after qualifying the third-year examination. A student is allowed to re-enter and complete the 4-year degree (Honours/ Honours with Research) within a span of 7 years.
- x. A student who secures 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wishes to undertake research at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year.
- xi. A student who wants to exit finally with a Bachelor's Certificate/ Bachelor's Diploma/ Bachelor's Degree must apply online within 25 days from the date of publication of results of first year, second year and third year respectively duly approved by the Colleges.
- xii. To secure qualifying grade in a Course/Semester, a student has to secure the minimum 30% marks in the Semester End Examination, 40% marks in the Practical Examination separately and an aggregate of 40% marks including Theoretical, Practical and Internal Assessment taken together.

- xiii. To qualify in a Practical-based course, an examinee is to appear in the Theoretical as well as the Practical examination. If a student fails to appear in any of the portion or fails to secure 30% and 40% marks in the theoretical and practical examinations respectively, the student will have to appear in the portion they have failed to secure the stipulated percentage of marks in the next corresponding semester.
- xiv. There will be no qualifying marks for internal assessment but the students will have to appear at the said part of the examination. There will be no scope of re-appearing in internal assessment examination for improvement of marks. Marks awarded in internal assessment will be credited to a student's performance in subsequent chances.
- xv. The qualifying marks for each course/ paper will be 40% in each semester taken together of internal assessment, semester end examinations, and practical examinations (minimum 30% marks in the semester end examination, minimum 40% marks in practical examinations separately).
- xvi. The Semester End Examinations will be held in the last month of the semesters, namely December (in the odd semesters) and in June (in the even semesters). The internal assessments will continue through the Semester.
- xvii. The provisional result of each semester will be published stating only the total marks and SGPA obtained by a student and the 'Grade Card' would be issued showing the details of courses studied (code, title, marks, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA of all the semesters at the end of each academic session. The provisional result after completion of each year

- will be published stating full marks, marks obtained, CGPA and Grade.
- xviii. If a student fails to secure qualifying (pass) marks in one paper or more in a particular semester examination, the result of semester examination will be declared as 'SNC' (i.e., Semester Not Cleared). The result of 6th semester examination will be kept withheld unless a student clears all the five semesters within the stipulated span of five years and a revival chance.
- xix. The result of 8th semester examination (Honours/ Honours with Research) will be kept withheld unless a student clears the 4th year (7th & 8th semesters) within the stipulated span of seven years. He/ she/ transgender would be declared to have passed the 4-year Bachelor's Degree (Honours/ Honours with Research) in a discipline in the year in which he/ she/ transgender clears his / her / transgender 8th semester.
- xx. In the Semester system, there would be automatic promotion right from the first Semester, till the 6th (sixth) Semester, irrespective of the marks obtained in the previous Semesters subject to the fact that the eligibility conditions for appearing in the examination are satisfied. A student must clear all the six (6) semesters to be promoted in the 7th semester and after completion of the 8th (eighth) semester within a span of 7 (seven) years will be declared passed with Honours/ Honours with Research.

COURSES OF STUDIES

a) There shall be two courses of studies leading to B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. / B.C.A. & B.B.A. Degree and each course shall be of Six Semesters duration. One shall be termed as "B.A./B.Sc./B. Com./B.C.A. & B.B.A. Honours Program" and the other is

- "B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Program"
- b) A student will have to study Discipline Specific Core Courses, Foundation Courses, Generic Electives Courses, Discipline Specific Elective Courses, and Skill Enhancement Courses as prescribed by the concerned Board of Studies

COURSE STRUCTURE

The HONOURS PROGRAM course shall be designed as having 140 credits delivered in six (06) semesters with 1950 marks. The PROGRAM course shall be designed as having 120 credits delivered in six (06) semesters with 1800 marks. Each Course shall be of 75 marks each except that AECC 1(ENVS) will be of 100 Marks and AECC 2 (English/MIL Communication) will be of 50 marks.

EXAMINATION & EVALUATION

Eligibility to appear in an Examination

A candidate shall be eligible for appearing at any of the Semesters of UNDER-GRADUATE EXAMINATIONS, fulfilling the following two essential conditions:

- Minimum 75% attendance of lectures delivered in all courses
- Students should appear in all internal assessments

The Evaluation of the students shall be a continuous process and shall be based on their performances in internal and the End-Semester examination.

Internal Evaluation

All the internal continuous evaluations shall be conducted by the Teachers of the Department. It shall be on the basis of Written Class Tests, Term Papers, Reports, Seminar Presentations, Field Work or any combinations thereof, spread over the entire period of study. Student should complete at least two out of three internal assessments before appearing at the respective semester examination.

Final Evaluation

There shall be one written and one practical examination (where applicable) at the end of each semester as per the prescribed syllabus in the course concerned. The final evaluation in a course means the total or aggregate of the marks obtained in internal evaluation and the marks obtained at the End-Semester Examination (Theoretical & Practical).

Validity of Students Enrollments / Registration: A candidate (Honours/Program Course) shall have to complete each semester examination with 3 (Three) consecutive chances including his/her first appearance in the concerned semester examination. If any of the chances mentioned above is not availed of by a candidate within the stipulated period, the chance shall be deemed to have lapsed,

A student will have, a maximum at the most, five academic years or ten semesters to complete the course

Qualifying Marks

- I. The qualifying marks for each course shall be 40% in each course of a semester taken together of internal assessment and semester end examination.
- II. To qualify in a Practical-based course, an examinee is to appear in the Theoretical as well as the Practical portion of the examination in the same Semester
- III. If a candidate secures qualifying grade (P grade) in all courses he / she / transgender will be declared to have qualified the said semester and the result will be shown as Q. However, if a student fails to secure qualifying grade P in a particular course his/her result of the concerned semesterend examination will be declared SNC (Semester Not Cleared). Marks obtained in the internal assessment will be clubbed with marks obtained in the semester examination before awarding the grade. If a candidate fails to secure pass grade in a particular Course, he / she / transgender will have to appear in that Course only. The internal assessment marks will be retained for next examination(s) with valid chances

Provisional Result and Grade Card

- 1) The provisional result of each semester will be published stating only the total marks and SGPA obtained by a candidate and the "Grade Sheet cum Report Card" would be issued showing the details of courses studied (code, title, marks, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA of all the semesters
- 2) The final result of a candidate shall be determined on the basis of CGPA.
- 3) Grade Card shall be made as per grading system. Coursewise marks (internal and term end exams added together) will be converted into percentage of mark.
