Semester-I

Topic:

Tragedy: The Function of Tragedy (Catharsis), Mimesis, Plot and Character in Tragedy, The Tragic Hero, Shakespearean Tragedy.

Course Objective:

Course Outcomes:

Students will be able to:

- critically analyse concepts like catharsis, hamartia, hubris etc.

Topic: AbhijnanaSakuntalam

Course Objective:

The purpose of the course is to make the students understand some of the prolific seminal classical texts (in translation) of Indian Literature and to make a thorough reading of Kalidasa's Abhijnana Sakuntalam.

Students will be able to

- understand themes of the text
- critically analyse the concept of Rasa
- critique the convergence between theory and practice, especially in theatre.
- explore the socio political cultural background of the age that produced the text.

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Topic: Old English Heroic Poetry and Elegies.
